A LITTLE HISTORY FIRST...

Black History Month, as it is now known, has roots dating back to 1926, with the development of Negro History Week. This was led by early 20th Century Historian Carter G. Woodson, the son of formerly enslaved people, and the second African American to receive a doctorate from Harvard, who wanted to change Black Americans

being left out of the narrative of American History. Woodson's goal was to have a week celebrating and teaching the cultural significance of the history of Black Americans. Woodson chose the week of February, 7th because of it's symbolism, which included the birthday's of Abraham Lincoln (February 12th) and Frederick Douglass (February 14th).

In 1976, the week long celebration was expanded, and Black History Month was born. That same year, President Ford urged Americans to observe Black History Month, but it was President Jimmy Carter who officially recognized Black History Month in 1978.





Yaa Gyasi was born in Ghana and raised in Huntsville, Alabama. Gyasi's debut was highly praised by critics and she has received several awards, including the National Book Critics Circle's John Leonard Award, PEN/ Hemingway Award, National Book Foundation's "5 under 35" and the 2020 Vilcek Prize for Creative Promise in Literature.



Transcendent Kingdom

Gifty, a sixth-year PhD student in neuroscience who was raised in a deeply religious family is studying how to adjust behaviors by triggering neurons in the brain through experiments with mice. Her own brother, Nana, died from a heroin overdose when she was 11, and her mother ended up in a deep depression as a result. Gifty's research is aimed at addressing both these things.

Transcendent Kingdom is a deeply moving exploration into faith, science, the African immigrant experience, family dynamics, addiction, and depression.


